Tilray is committed to advancing the scientific understanding of the therapeutic potential and risks of medicines derived from cannabis.

Current clinical trials being supported by Tilray include:

Safety, tolerability and efficacy of cannabinoids for chemotherapy-induced nausea and vomiting: Oncologists practicing at Chris O'Brien Lifehouse Hospital in Sydney, Australia have partnered with the University of Sydney and the government of New South Wales to determine the effectiveness of a combination of cannabinoids in patients with chemotherapy-induced nausea and vomiting. Tilray is supplying a proprietary capsule formulation, which contains plant-extracted THC and CBD.

Safety, tolerability and efficacy in PTSD: Tilray is providing the clinical formulation for a randomized, placebo-controlled trial to test whether different types of vaporized cannabis can reduce symptoms associated with PTSD in Canadian military veterans, former law enforcement officers, and sexual assault survivors.

Safety and tolerability of cannabinoids in children with Dravet Syndrome: Pediatric epileptologists in Toronto, Canada have demonstrated promising safety and tolerability data in children with a severe drug-resistant epilepsy due to Dravet Syndrome. Tilray has provided a liquid formulation containing high amounts of plant-extracted cannabidiol (CBD) and conservative amounts of tetrahydrocannabinol (THC).

Effects of medical cannabinoid use on driving safety (DUID). The University of Sydney has selected Tilray to supply medical cannabis for a study designed to compare the effects of a variety of medical grade cannabis preparations containing various concentrations of the THC and CBD on driving performance through inhaled vaporization consumption. The findings of the study will help inform Australia's DUID regulations for medical cannabis patients, and can also be made available to other countries.

Safety, tolerability, and efficacy for Essential Tremor (ET): Tilray is providing a cannabinoid formulation for the trial in capsule form, which will allow researchers to test an oral cannabis formulation comprised of cannabidiol (CBD) and low-dose tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) for treatment of ET. This was the first ever DEA approved export of medical cannabis to the U.S.

How to talk with your healthcare professional about medical cannabis

Some patients find it difficult to talk with their healthcare professional about medical cannabis. Your healthcare team is genuinely interested in your wellbeing and can help you understand whether medical cannabis is a good option for you.

The following are some points to consider prior to speaking with your healthcare professional.

Be prepared

Preparation will help you talk to your healthcare professional. Medical cannabis is used for many conditions, from chronic pain to sleep disorders. Contact us to find out more about how cannabis has been used to help your particular symptoms.

Be informed about the types of cannabis products available

There are different ways to consume cannabis. You can inhale using a vapourizer or ingest cannabis oil or softgels. Since healthcare professionals are concerned about the health risks of smoking any plant material and will advise against inhaling cannabis smoke, we recommend that you use a vapourizer if you intend to inhale. Vapourizing heats the medical cannabis to a point where the active compounds (e.g., THC and CBD) are released, but combustion of the dried plant material does not occur.

Support your healthcare team with information

Your healthcare professional may not be familiar with authorizing medical cannabis. Suggest they reach out to our medical education team who can provide additional information on current clinical evidence for use, dosing guidance, and safety considerations.
